Asking Difficult Questions

There are two stories in Acts 16:16-34: Paul's exorcism of a spirit of divination, followed by Paul and Silas' imprisonment and the conversion of the jailer. The first begins: "One day, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slave-girl . . ." (v. 16, NRSV). These first-person passages have mystified scholars for years. The most plausible explanation is that Luke, the author, wrote them while traveling with Paul. The second story is told in third person.

Another difference between these two stories is that the exorcism does not prescribe what the reader is to do with the story, what right course of action to take or behavior to emulate. We are simply left with a depiction of Paul that is not very flattering.

The first story invites us to imagine the all-too-human response of Paul, and the cultural conditions that made this story believable. We may ask some difficult questions of the text, and of ourselves:

- We don't know what became of the slave-girl. Did it matter to her that Paul's motives had more to do with alleviating annoyance than showing compassion?
- Why does the NRSV translation refer to her as a "girl" rather than a "woman"? Was she very young, or did she not deserve enough consideration and respect in the culture?
- The girl's owners held great power over her. What are we to make of a system that, without regard to another's wellbeing, accepts using others for personal gain? In today's world, where do men exercise power or control over women primarily for their own benefit?
- The owners complained to the magistrates: "These men . . . are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt" (vv. 20-21). What do we do when following Jesus conflicts with prevailing cultural and political values?

It is valuable to explore such questions together, even though this passage does not give answers. We must go elsewhere in the Bible and the teachings of Jesus to find truth for our lives.


